As the public policy voice of the five bishops of Washington state, the Washington State Catholic Conference (WSCC) advocates for policies that serve the common good and recognize the dignity of every human person. Our advocacy is guided by Catholic Social Teaching, and supporting Catholic schools and education is a key goal of our mission.

Federal Educational Choice and Washington State

The Educational Choice for Children Act was introduced by Rep. Adrian Smith from Nebraska. It created a fund with a \$10 billion annual cap that individuals and corporations could contribute to for a tax credit equal to their contribution. Students in families living up to 300% of the regional median income would be eligible for the funds. The bill included strong protections for religious liberty and parental autonomy.

Provisions of the bill were included in the House budget reconciliation package, with some important changes. First, rather than being a mandate, each state must opt into the program. While the bill is not explicit, it is expected that governors will be the ones to opt in by notifying the federal Treasury Department by Jan. 1, 2027. States that do choose to participate



have some power to shape the way the program operates within their state, raising questions that have yet to be answered about the ability of a state to exclude religious schools. Much still depends on rules to be written by Treasury to guide implementation of the program.

The final version of the program provides up to a \$1700 credit per taxpayer for contributions made to scholarship granting organizations (SGO). The SGOs provide the funds received through contributions to families to pay for a range of approved expenses, including private school tuition, tutoring, services for students with disabilities, transportation or other expenses that may be incurred by children in public or private schools. Families making up to 300% of the local median income qualify for the scholarship funds (estimates suggest 80-90% of families will be eligible based on this threshold).

It is unclear how much funding will be available for scholarships. The \$1,700 limit on contributions will require more participants to max out their contributions versus the earlier bill that would have allowed a large corporation or wealthy individual to make multi-million dollar contributions, potentially slowing the process for growing scholarship funds.

In Washington state, it seems likely that Superintendent of Public Instruction Chris Reykdal will encourage Gov. Ferguson to oppose opting into the scholarship program, despite the state's massive budget woes and the reality that the program could provide substantial non-governmental funding for both public and private schools, depending on how parents seek to use the scholarships. Advocacy from lower income parents striving to ensure their students have equal access to schools, services and programs that will help their students achieve success will be critically important.

In the coming months, the WSCC will be developing messaging and strategies to encourage Gov. Ferguson to opt into the scholarship program.
